

José García Torres

did not have the honor of meeting José García Torres, but I understand that he was a great man who loved America and showed it through his service.

Mr. Torres was born on January 27th, 1924, in Almeria, Spain. Jesuit priests educated him until the outbreak of the Spanish Civil War. His early teen years were spent traversing Spain with his younger sister, Encarnación García de la Haza, to keep away from war zones. After a number of attempts, Jose managed to stow away on a ship that would eventually get him to the United States.

But before that, after many unsuccessful attempts of stowing away, Mr. Torres made friends with the bread man at the port and started to make deliveries to the ships. He delivered bread one day to a ship headed for the north of Africa and ended up serving in the British Merchant Service.

During his time with them, he survived the torpedoing and sinking of the Empire Lytton. He also served in the Merchant Marines, a division of the United States Coast Guard, with his service spanning three theaters: the Atlantic War Zone, the Mediterranean War Zone, and the Pacific War Zone. He was at Yokohama Harbor in 1945 when the Japanese surrendered. Eventually, Mr. Torres was honorably discharged with commendations from President Harry S. Truman.

The U.S. Merchant Marines have a rich history. Their wartime record reveals that their losses were among the highest of any group at the front lines. They died at a rate of 1 in 24. All told, 733 American cargo ships were lost and 8,651 of the 215,000 who served perished on troubled waters.

Their biggest supporter was President Franklin D. Roosevelt. While the war was underway, he proclaimed, "Mariners have written one of its most brilliant chapters. They have delivered the goods when and where needed



in every theater of operations and across every ocean in the biggest, the most difficult, and dangerous job ever undertaken. As time goes on, there will be greater public understanding of our merchant's fleet record during this war."

But it wasn't to be. With Roosevelt's death in 1945, the Merchant Marines lost their staunchest supporter and any chance to share in the accolades afforded to others who served. The War Department, the same government branch that recruited them, opposed the Seaman's Bill of Rights in 1947 and managed to kill the

legislation in congressional committee, effectively ending any chance for seamen to reap the thanks of the nation. For 43 years, the U.S. government denied benefits ranging from housing to health care until Congress awarded them veterans status in 1988, too late for 125,000 mariners, roughly half of those who had served.

Mr. Torres settled in New Jersey where he married Doris Perez Vazquez, the love of his life for 70 years. Mr. Torres served in the Nutley Police Auxiliary for ten years, was a member of the American Legion, and retired as a Master Lithographer in the printing industry, where he worked at Baker Printing and Colortron. Two of his favorite hobbies were photography and skiing.

José García Torres, you have lived a great life, sir, and the love for your family, your town, and for your country should be commended. Your country thanks you, your town thanks you, and I thank you for your service. ■

Having a Cold While Pregnant?

A Local Physician Shares What To Do And How To **Ease Your Symptoms While Keeping Your Baby Safe**

ver-the-counter remedies for the symptoms of a common cold-sneezing, coughing, congestion, a sore throat-are easy to find. But if you're an expectant mother or a mom who is nursing, how do you find relief while being sure your medications don't affect your baby?

LESS IS MORE "If you can limit medications, that's always safer and better," says Michael Straker, MD, Director of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology at Clara Maass Medical Center. For congestion, he suggests the use of a saline nasal spray or steam from a neti pot, and plenty of fluids. For a sore throat, try gargling with salt water. Chicken soup and plenty of rest can relieve symptoms as well.

"For aches, acetaminophen (for example, Tylenol, rather than products containing aspirin, ibuprofen or naproxen) is safe throughout pregnancy," says Dr. Straker. "The same is true for cough medicines with guaifenesin (an expectorant) or dextromethorphan (a suppressant)," he says, "though it's best to consult your physician first."

"Read labels carefully before you take any cold medicine, particularly for multi-symptom products," advises Dr. Straker. "People often load up on different types of cold medicine because the brand names are different, but the ingredients are the same," he says. "You may be taking too much of a given ingredient without knowing it." Drug labels should also list any appropriate warnings for pregnant women.

■ WHEN TO CALL THE DOCTOR There is no one-sizefits-all recommendation for when to call a doctor-whether your OB/GYN or primary care physician—about cold symptoms, Dr. Straker says. However, troubling signs include fever and chills, shortness of breath or an increased heart rate, and symptoms that linger more than 10 days or become more persistent. In those situations, a pregnant

woman should seek the care of a doctor.

"A temperature of 100.5 or above is considered a fever, but a fever isn't necessarily cause for concern," he says. "It's the body's way of removing an infectious agent. However, if a woman has a stubborn fever that will not come down with Tylenol

and increased fluids, as well as significant physical discomfort, she should contact her doctor and possibly be seen right away."

■ TAKING CARE OF YOU "An expectant or new mom already has a compromised immune system because so much of her body's energy is being used to support her baby," Dr. Straker says. "To lessen the chances of catching cold, pregnant and nursing women should follow a balanced diet, remain active, avoid those who are sick and wash hands frequently with soap and warm water.

"In addition, the flu shot is not only safe for pregnant and nursing moms, it's recommended," he says. "It helps to protect mom, and mom passes those antibodies to the

"Any time you're concerned, talk to your doctor," says Dr. Straker. "He or she will walk you through whatever you're experiencing." ■



Nutley's Memorial Parkway How Nutley's Magnificent Memorial to Its World War One Veterans Came to Be By Barry Lenson

hen you have strolled by our beloved Mudhole in Memorial Park, have you noticed the elegant old trees that line your path? And when you have arrived at the Chestnut Street entrance to the park, have you stopped to read a plaque on a large stone that bears the names of Nutley soldiers who died in World War I?

If you have, you have experienced Nutley's Memorial Parkway, an enduring remembrance of Nutley's soldiers who died in World War I. Memorial Parkway is a permanent commemoration of our young men and women who fought more than a century ago in what was then called The Great War.



In 1919, a group of dedicated Nutleyites formed a committee to create a memorial to honor Nutley's soldiers who served in World War I. The committee planned to purchase a strip of land by Kingsland Pond (now known as The Mudhole) from the Schneider family, which owned it, and to plant an arcade of trees and shrubs alongside a path that would run through it.

Several plans were considered. The first was to plant 427 trees: one for each Nutley citizen who served in the war. All their names would appear on a special memorial. In addition, a second memorial would bear the names of the Nutleyites who perished in the war.

In the end, a somewhat simplified plan was set in motion. The committee would ask every citizen of Nutley to contribute either \$25.00 to pay for the installation of one tree, or \$1.00 to pay for one shrub. And in the end, two memorials with bronze plaques were installed in a way that differed from the original plan; one would inform park visitors that they were entering the Memorial Parkway, and another would bear the names of Nutley residents who perished in the war. Both those memorials are still in place today.

Here is an excerpt of a fundraising letter that the committee sent out to all town residents on June 17, 1919 ...



This is not the project of any small group of men. We are convinced that it will appeal to the sympathies and understanding of everyone in Nutley and will receive prompt and enthusiastic support.

There is nothing sectional or restricted about it ... The soldiers came from all over town, people from all over town will buy the trees

and shrubs ... We hope that every living soul in Nutley will buy at least one tree or shrub for this Parkway.

As much honor goes with a small subscription as with a large one. All will give according to their means.

The people of Nutley were moved to contribute funds to buy the land and install a number of trees. We do not now know the exact number of those original trees that were planted on the newly created Memorial Parkway. But many are still there today.

Every time we walk through this section of our town's parks, let us pause to thank both our Nutley forefathers who had the idea of creating Memorial Parkway and to remember the Nutley soldiers who fought to protect our nation and defend our way of life.

Swimming Superstars Charitable Foundation Coming Soon




wimming Superstars Charitable Foundation, Inc., the brainchild of Ron Mosca, parent and Nutley firefighter, is a nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization being founded by parents of children on the autistic spectrum in conjunction with the Nutley Fire Department, the Township of Nutley and with the support of the Nutley FMBA and Nutley Police Department. Its purpose is to provide free "survival"

swimming lessons to children with disabilities.

Ron Mosca, a 20-year veteran of the Nutley Fire Department, decided to pursue the formation of this charitable foundation because drowning is the leading cause of death among children on the autistic spectrum. His pursuit has picked up momentum thanks to the backing of various





township organizations and supporters and fundraising will start soon. Ron's hope is to raise enough money to offer these survival swimming lessons at no cost to families of children with disabilities for many years into the future. A study released in 2017 by the National Autism Association (NAA) highlights the risk of injury and death related to missing persons with an Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD), specifically those who wander or elope from safe environments.

The study, NAA Mortality & Risk in ASD Wandering/ Elopement, found that nearly a third of reported ASD missing person cases related to wandering/elopement from 2011 to 2016 in the United States ended in death or required medical attention. The study was based on over 800 media-reported missing person cases in the U.S. over a six-year period involving individuals with an ASD. According to the study, accidental drowning was responsible for over 70% of lethal outcomes, Lori McIlwain of the National Autism Association stated these findings likely underrepresented the issue of wandering/elopement and its associated risks. "It's very likely these cases are happening at a much higher rate than what's being reported."

ne of my favorite days of the year is March 19. On that day, we celebrate the Spring Equinox, or Ostara. This means that the length of day and night are equal on this date. After March 19, we enter the phase of the year where the Northern Hemisphere begins to tilt toward the sun, giving us longer, brighter days.

The Spring Equinox is celebrated by a variety of cultures and religions around the world. The one thing that all these celebrations have in common is the theme of change. Of renewal and rebirth, and the arrival of something new. I love that.

I love it because there is something magical in the idea that we made it through days that were darker and colder and now things are changing. What's on the other side of that change is a chance at something warmer and more radiant.

I'll give you another example. I recently went to the Planetarium in Jersey City (I highly recommend it!) and my friend and I watched a film inside the dome that talked about how stars develop. Basically, these things called molecular clouds contain large amounts of air and dust that change and move around over time. As they are undergoing all of this change, it looks like they are collapsing. Actually, what they are doing is drawing more matter into the area and eventually a star is created. At first it can look like it's over and done, with no hope of anything good coming from it. But that's not it at all. Not even close. What



happened is that all of that change, even when it looked uncertain, allowed this molecular cloud to develop into something remarkably beautiful.

This isn't to say change is easy. I tell my patients that there is always some reason to feel like you aren't ready to change something about your health. The truth is, we get comfortable with our ailments. There's something predictable about them. We can even get so used to anxiety and depression that when we start to feel good, it almost feels unsettling. It can be tough to see what's on the other side. It might feel overwhelming because we have so many things that need to be addressed, that it's just easier to live with things the way they are. It could be one particular thing, but it's been going on for so long that it has just become part of life as we know it. So, yeah, change is hard. But that doesn't mean we shouldn't try.


Leaning into the light, much the same way as Earth does during the Spring Equinox, means leaning away from something else. We can't do it any other way. When we want to change things about our health, that sometimes means we have to let go of some of the patterns that have become comfortable.

What I mean by that is this: we need to lean in to the possibility of creating something different for ourselves. We need to be okay with the fact that changing, while sometimes challenging, can lead to something brighter. The Earth does it every year. We can too.


