

Anne Rotonda's Relay of Giving

nne Rotonda is all about giving. She may be best known for her work as the director of the Special Young Adults (SYA) organization here in town for the past 39 years. Many people speak not only of her dedication in this position, but also of the genuine love and support she gives to the countless young adults who have walked in the doors and literally entered her life.

Other people will associate her with Annie's Courage, one of Nutley's Relay for Life teams. What some may not know is that this team was started by Linda Buset on Anne's

"In 2013 when Annie was diagnosed with acute myeloid leukemia, as her friend, I felt so helpless as to what I could do for her," Linda said. "I knew she had a long road ahead of her and I needed to do something so I decided to form a team in Annie's honor. A team which would raise money while Annie was fighting for her life. I called Annie while she was in the hospital and together we came up with the

name 'Annie's Courage.' I put out a call for team members and in one day, we were a team of 10. Although Annie couldn't do any legwork, she was our inspiration and the driving force behind the team."

That year, Annie's Courage reached Gold Level and raised well over 5,000 dollars.

Annie went through her treatments and arrived at Relay for Life in May of 2014 in complete remission.

"It was our miracle," Linda said. "Annie received the Eternal Flame Award that evening, and Nutley Relay 2014 was dedicated to her. The following year Annie, in great health, took the reins as Captain of Team Annie's Courage and I went on to co-chair the Survivors Tent with Rosemarie Brush."

"In 2017, Annie was re-diagnosed with the same disease, and in September received a bone marrow transplant. Annie asked me to come back to the team as a member. How could I say no? As a team we reached Emerald Level. Something never achieved before in Nutley."

"Annie is one of the most selfless, giving, loving people I know. Annie inspires people to do better, do more, smile through adversity, have courage, stay strong, keep the faith and never, ever give up. Annie lives her life in service to others. My life is better just by knowing Annie; she brings out the best in everyone whose life she touches."

"Annie is Nutley's

Angel, always doing for others from the depths of her beautiful heart," Linda said.

To date, Annie's Courage has raised almost \$26,000. Yet, there is another 'giving' that is at the heart of Anne's life: she gives thanks.

"I'm blessed," Anne said. "For five and a half years, I had the finest four-legged nurse. R.J. was a Choodle (Chihuahua and poodle mix) and he gave me the best care ever. It was especially sad when he passed away suddenly in February. For 14 years, he was part of the family and he is missed every day. He would lie next to me for hours

and I would say that between R.J. and Jimmy I had around-the-clock care."

"I do not have the words to express all that my brother, Jimmy, has done for me. Not only does he bring me to doctor's appointments and treatments, he is there for me as a source of encouragement and caring. Basically, without

him, I would not have made it this far."

"I also have many supportive friends who call or text regularly," she said. "I especially want to mention Dayna Hess and Heather Soto. Heather has been bringing me homemade soup, made by her mother-in-law, each week."

Each interaction is especially important to Anne since she loves people. "I realize how much the cancer has isolated me. I cannot get out to see people or even eat in restaurants since my blood count is so low."

She also praises the town and its officials.

"When the doctors told me I needed a transplant, the

Board of Commissioners held a bone marrow drive at the Nutley Health Department," she said.

Anne is held in very high regard among the town's leaders. In recent articles or at events, these are some of the ways she has been described.

"Anne is one of our most cherished citizens," Nutley Commissioner Joe Scarpelli said.

Commissioners Mauro Tucci and Alphonse Petracco refer to her as "our Nutley angel."

And there's the idea of 'giving' again. That one action has seemed to define Anne Rotonda.

As a high school student here in town, she remembers watching the documentary, *Willowbrook: The Last Great Disgrace*. Geraldo Rivera detailed the atrocities of an asylum that was made to help the developmentally disabled and the mentally ill. Saddened and sickened by what she saw, Anne took action.

"I went there to visit. It was worse than I imagined. I saw a child soaked in urine, holding up a feeble hand," she said.

When Anne returned home, she held a clothing drive to raise money to help change the conditions in the asylum.

Anne saw something that needed to be done to improve the lives of people, and she found a way to give.

This also gave her a career path. "After I graduated high school, I went to Kean College and got a teaching degree in special education. My work at SYA has given me many opportunities to help young people over the years."

The ARC of Essex County oversees this program which has been very successful in Nutley, thanks in large part of the work of Anne.

There is one more way 'giving' relates to Anne Rotonda: sometimes life gives us things that are difficult, yet have a bigger meaning.

If Anne had not seen the documentary and been touched by the horrific conditions at the asylum, perhaps she would not have gotten a degree in special education and been such a motivating and encouraging force at SYA.

If Anne was not diagnosed with AML, perhaps she would not have been able to touch the lives of so many people.

Anne Rotonda has been given a life's journey that may be harder than most people's, but her optimism and positive outlook is what she gives to all of us.

Talking to her has 'given' me inspiration and I am very happy our paths crossed within the pages of *Nutley Neighbors*. ■

Another program is Teentech, a one-day program of hands-on workshops designed to educate girls about STEM careers. This year, Montclair State University, in partnership with AAUW NJ, welcomed more than 140 students and educators from high schools throughout New Jersey. Students worked directly with the faculty and assistants from the College of Science and Mathematics on a variety of hands-on workshops designed to educate girls about opportunities in STEM careers.

The Nutley Branch of AAUW has also offered scholarship opportunities for young women who are seniors in Nutley High School and who are planning on attending a college or university. Nutley AAUW has long understood that supporting young women in their educational endeavors is a priority.

This past December, the Nutley Branch of AAUW celebrated its 91st anniversary. ■

A Brief History of Nutley During the Prohibition Years ...

Who Did You Need to Know to Get a Drink Around Here?

B efore we explore the history of Nutley during the era of Prohibition, let me explain that this article is not intended to encourage or tempt people to consume alcoholic bever-

ages. The purpose of this article is simply to relate some fascinating Nutley history from the years when drinking alcohol was prohibited by law.

■ A Bit of History

From 1920 until 1933, Federal law prohibited the manufacturing, transport, and sale of alcoholic beverages in the United States. But did that mean that the resourceful people of Nutley stopped drinking for 13 years? Not at all.

Here are some of the ways the people of Nutley managed to enjoy alcoholic beverages during Prohibition.

We have historical record that one was located in the basement of the Kingsland Manor. It was owned and run by a colorful character named Bus McGinnity, whose father was a trainer and promoter of prizefighters. According to information on the Kingsland Manor's website, that speakeasy became a legal bar when Prohibition ended, and then it became a convalescent home. That transition seems to make sense, doesn't it?

■ You Could Go to a Speakeasy

During the Prohibition era, an illegal bar was called a "speakeasy" for a very simple reason. When you were in one of them, you had to speak quietly so police who were passing by couldn't hear that there were people inside drinking. (Of course, the police were probably inside the bar drinking too, but let's not dwell on that.)

Were there speakeasies in Nutley? Yes, there were.

You Could Get a Prescription for Alcohol

That's right. During Prohibition, physicians could write out a prescription that you could take to a pharmacy, which would send you home with a small flask of whiskey, which was prescribed for certain ailments, including nervousness. (That could explain why so many people became nervous during the Roaring Twenties.)

At the Nutley Historical Society, we have a prescription



form for alcohol that was filled at Heberling's Drug Store on Passaic Avenue. It is a fascinating document and an intriguing part of Nutley History.

You could probably also buy illegal booze in Nutley, but we don't know where.


■ You Could Make Your Own Wine


For centuries, making wine has been traditional in many Italian families especially. It still is today, and chances are good that you either know someone in Nutley who makes wine . . . or you make it yourself.


Given the popularity of making wine in the home, it seems impossible to believe that the people of Nutley stopped doing it for 13 years and drank water with their meals. I am also willing to bet that more than a few bottles of homemade wine were shared between neighbors passed across the back fence with words like, "Here's what I'm making this year . . . what about you?"



Retirees Face Higher Costs that Lurk While Inflation is Low

he U.S. economy is growing faster than its long-term pace, unemployment is low, and wages are increasing. Yet, core inflation-which was 1.6% in March-hasn't moved in a meaningful way. This absence of price increases has been a key factor for the Federal Reserve's decision to push pause on interest-rate increases.

But while economists talk about inflation—which looks at a wide range of personal goods and services-financial advisors have a different calculus. Retirees spend a good portion of their money on health care and leisure. These prices have been going up faster than the broader inflation numbers. When estimating future retirement needs or evaluating withdrawal rates, it's best to typically double the inflation rate; most plans assume 3.5% inflation. Erring on the side of caution in your overall estimate is a must when planning for long-term spending.

As an additional step, retirees can also take a targeted approach. Map out the biggest expenses and look for



ways to save for them-or keep rising prices in check.

■ Save Specifically for Health Care

National health care spending increased by an estimated 5.5% in 2018, according to the latest projections from the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services. Meanwhile, prices for many procedures, such as knee replacements and hospital stays, have been increasing at a faster pace than the economy overall, accord-

ing to data compiled by the Peterson-Kaiser Health System Tracker.

Retirees should to try to maximize savings in a Health Savings Account (HSA). These accounts offer what advisors call a triple tax benefit because they allow annual taxdeductible contributions of up to \$3,500 per person and \$7,000 for families (plus another \$1,000 for people age 55 and older).

There is no use-it-or-lose-it provision for these accounts, and any earnings in them grow tax-free. When it's time to use the funds for qualified health care expenses, those withdrawals are also sans tax. To make contributions, however, you need to be in an HSA-qualified insurance plan.

Home in on Affordable Markets

Housing prices have also been outpacing inflation. Nationally, home prices increased 4.9% between February 2018 and February 2019, according to the latest numbers

from the Federal Housing Finance Agency.

While many would-be retirees work around this by paying off their mortgages and staying put, this strategy can fall apart for anyone planning to relocate to a pricier market or senior housing.

Independent living rates for seniors grew by 2.6% from 2017 to 2018, assisted-living costs for seniors increased 2.4%, and memory care was up 3.2%, according to senior-housing referral service, A Place for Mom.

Fortunately, housing prices vary greatly from one market to the next, and this is also true of senior housing. For retirees with the latitude to relocate, shopping for a more affordable market is one way to mitigate home price inflation

Last but Not Least-Leisure

On the whole, travel prices have been increasing in pace with inflation. The latest stats from the U.S. Travel Association show an annual increase of 1.9%, although lower transportation costs-including a nearly 3% drop in airline fares—have offset higher prices in other areas. Food costs while traveling and lodging both increased roughly 3% between March 2018 and March 2019.

Of course, the biggest driver of travel and recreation expenses isn't an increase in prices, but an increase in leisure time. In a survey by Capital Group, 40% of retired baby boomers said they are spending more than they had planned on travel.

The best way for retirees to keep these costs in check

Whether it's performing arts, music festivals or quirky conferences, volunteers are often privy to some of the best seats in the house, plus discounted tickets to other events.







Alvin "Al" Baxter-Green

A lvin "Al" Baxter-Green, World War Two veteran, and recipient of the Bronze Star, the Purple Heart, and the French Liberation Medal, is one of the finest human beings that I have ever met. At ninety-seven years of age, this man is truly unstoppable; he explained with enthusiasm how he attends

weekly meetings at the Nutley Old Guard and has a passion for bowling.

Since Al's mother wanted to keep her maiden name as well, an extremely rare procedure in those days, Al has a very Old English, hyphenated last name for the rest of his life.

He was born on October 19, 1922, enlisted into the United States Army in 1942, had basic training at Camp Atterbury in Indiana, and then was shipped over to England. He was initially trained as a switchboard





operator, but later completed military exercises as he and many others prepared for what would be the biggest invasion in the history of the world:

code named "Operation Overlord."

Al was part of the advanced group landing, D-Day Plus 1, which means he arrived on the beaches around midnight of the second day. His training included becoming a line man, in which he would run telephone lines, sometimes under enemy fire, to make sure the lines of communication were always open from battalion head-quarters to the men in the field. If the line was damaged, it was up to Al to repair it.

The first time Al was injured, he had decided to run a new line in an apple orchard. He was behind a hedgerow, a very

thick and dense wall of bushes and trees, so thick it could stop a tank. Within certain areas lay German machine gun nests as well as snipers. The entire purpose of the German defenses was to delay the American advance should the Americans land in this part of France. It was among these hedgerows, in an apple orchard, where a German rocket

landed several feet away from Al, and blew him off his feet and on to the ground. He was hit in the arm, the leg, and the ankle with shrapnel, lost consciousness, and hospitalized for four days.

There was never enough time to recover fully from your injuries and so he was sent back into the war very quickly. It was a short time later that Al was loading a truck when a barrage of rockets targeted his area. I asked him if he was hit again. He responded, No, I was blown up."

"I had amnesia for a month

while in the hospital. I had no recollection of anything and nothing to identify me. I was not missing any body parts, I just had no memory. They tried shock treatments and all kinds of methods to bring back my memory, but nothing worked. Then one day, a fellow soldier walked into the hospital, took a look at me, and said 'Baxter it's you, we

thought you were dead.' The nurses kept him talking to me as slowly my memory came back. I started to remember names and places. Two days later I woke up, looked at the nurses and said, where the hell am I and why am I here? They asked if I knew my name and I said yes, and then they sent me on my way."

"I was able to get a three-day pass to see relatives while I was in England and recovering. I met some wonderful people, and then had to return to France. I was put in a company where everyone was previously wounded. When the Inspector General and medical teams inspected the group of men, it was determined that these men had seen enough and most had enough points to go home anyway. Finally, I was given a furlough to go back to the States, and on August 2nd, 1945, I was married to my beautiful wife."

"After the war, we settled down in Nutley. She and I traveled the country, had three wonderful children, I worked for Devoe Paint Company and retired."

Alvin "Al" Baxter-Green, it was my honor to meet you, sir. Your country thanks you, your town thanks you, and I thank you. ■
