

Rusty, Meghan, Abigail, Grace, and Jake

Tuning in to the Myers Family

elevision brings us everything from entertainment to information, but perhaps the best part is the engaging people who fill the screen, whether actors or hosts on a talk show. Russell 'Rusty' Myers, director of *FOX* and *Friends First*, has the best of both worlds.

At work he interacts with people who make the news, while at home in Nutley he enjoys family life among neighbors who have made this the ideal place.

"Meghan and I have been married since 2007, and we moved to the Avondale section of town in February 2008," he said. "My father-in-law is a real estate agent, and when we were looking for houses, we tried everywhere in the area– Clifton, Rutherford, North Arlington, Lyndhurst–but we fell in love with Nutley. We looked at probably only three or four houses here, and when we saw the house we are in now, we knew this is where we wanted to land."

Over the years, that house has welcomed new additions to the Myers family.

"Abigail is 14, attends Nutley High School, and was named after Abigail Adams." Rusty said. "She has been very involved in choir and drama throughout her life, having a role most recently in the recreation department's production of *Frozen Jr*. She is very passionate about anything space-related and loves science."

"Grace is 13 and goes to John H. Walker Middle School," he continues. "She sings in the choir, is a member of the jazz ensemble and drama club at

school and is a year-round athlete. Jake is 9 and was named after my great-grandfather, Jacob, the first immigrant in my family who came here from Poland. He loves music class with Miss Rizzo and science class. All our kids are very involved in the community; both girls are in Girl Scouts and Jake is a Cub Scout."



The Myers children aren't the only ones active in town, both Rusty and Meghan volunteer at many different places.

"My wife takes volunteer work to the next level!" Rusty said, smiling. "Meghan is vice president at the John H. Walker Middle School PTO, is a leader for both of our daughters' Girl Scout troops and Jake's scout den. She is the 'Popcorn Kernel' for Pack 141 and has coached our children's track, soccer, and basketball teams. Volunteering as a CCD teacher at St. Mary's and her job as an aide at the middle school are a couple other things she does! She loves interacting with the kids. Practically every

time we're in town at a restaurant or at an event, someone runs up to her shouting 'Mrs. Myers!' She gets invited by the kids to their sports games, their plays, and their recitals. It's a testament to how much they like her."

While Rusty's job takes him into New York City, he finds time to pursue a special interest right here in town.

"I am deeply involved with the Sons of the American Legion," he said. "This is something that gives me direction and focus. I'm excited to have been given chances along the way to hold office at the county and state level, which is my way of trying to do a little good in the world. The American

> Legion is such a force for good in America, and it's a privilege to be a part of it. I have met and worked alongside so many hard-working wonderful people."

As a family, one of their favorite places to be is outdoors.

"One thing that makes me so proud of my children is how they are able to unplug and go into the great outdoors to camp with no technology," Rusty said. "We don't ever like to waste a beautiful day. We hike, fish, and do

whatever we can to be outside. We all live for New Jersey's warmer weather. We camp a good deal, enjoying New Jersey's state campgrounds. We ski during the winter, doing day trips and one extended trip each year."

Rusty and Meghan share the motivation behind all they do as parents.

"Our logic has always been that we have our children at

home for such a short time in our lives, so let's maximize it and enjoy every second," he said. "I heard at work recently that 90% of your time as a parent is with your kid before they are 18. Sometimes we feel like we are running around like crazy trying to do things with them, but one day that will be over. So, to be outside together just enjoying each other's company is one of the true blessings in life. That was one of the things that appealed to us about Nutley when we were looking to buy a house and settle down. This is a place where you want to spend your time outside."

But the time Rusty spends inside working for the FOX News Channel is also very important.

"I just celebrated my 21st anniversary with the company," he said. "I currently work directing the show *FOX and Friends First* with Todd Pirro and Carley Shimkus from 5-6am,

though over the years I have directed a wide variety of shows across FOX's properties. Years ago, when I was a stage manager, I worked with Geraldo Rivera on his weekend show *Geraldo At Large*. I have been very lucky to have had a front

row seat for much of the breaking news over the years."


Yet, his front row seat here in Nutley gives him an excellent view of a community that he loves.

Nutley History

A House Divided

uring the summer of 1924, the Bank of Nutley decided against upgrading their 1909 headquarters on Chestnut and Elm streets (now Vincent Place) in favor of a new bank just up the road on the Franklin Avenue corner opposite the oval. Franklin had recently surpassed



Passaic Avenue as Nutley's principal business venue, and the bank wanted in.

That property included a home built in 1834 by Abraham Vreeland and his son Warren. The bank was set to clear the land for construction when Mrs. Dorothy Leaman bought the old home with the intent of having it rolled on timbers down Chestnut Street to a lot they owned on the Enclosure.

This is where the fun begins, where immovable tree meets unstoppable home. No sooner had the 90-year-old structure been moved 100 feet than it encountered a large elm.

And when a four-inch-diameter limb was broken off a maple, Nutley's Shade Tree Committee literally stepped in to order that the house be moved no farther.

The movers had their permit and noted that it was the town's responsibility, not theirs, to protect its trees, and that the town should have thought it through before issuing a permit. They couldn't care less about the trees; it

was all about moving the house.

And when George Scorso, chairman of the Shade Tree Committee, was asked what was to become of the home sitting on timbers blocking traffic on Chestnut Street, he said it was of no concern to him; it was all about protecting the trees.

And until it was all figured out, a patrolman was stationed on the street with orders to arrest any mover who resumed work.

So, what to do? It's not recorded who

had the King Solomon aha moment, but the agreed-upon solution was to cut the house in two and move the smaller sections east to Hamilton Place and then the Enclosure. But even with that, the side street proved too narrow to



allow safe, easy passage, and again progress was stopped.

Mayor Stager intervened, allowing the movers to resume work with the promise that they "show more consideration for the trees." And they did, using ropes to draw aside tree limbs to allow the sections to squeeze through.

Finally, three weeks after the house was first lifted onto timbers to be rolled to its new home, it reached the Enclosure, where reassembling began.

Meanwhile, on Hamilton Place, some limbs were broken off an old hemlock and countless leaves were shorn from trees, but serious damage had been avoided. It was left to the homeowners along that street to clean up the mess, which included thousands of farming magazines that had once belonged to Warren Vreeland and had been jostled from the now-exposed attic during the move.

Kudos to Nutley's Shade Tree Commission, who 100 years ago stood up to developers who cared little about our trees, and a shout-out to today's Shade Tree Committee and groups like Nutley Tree Rescue to continue that work.


• ummers are filled with vacations, swimming in the pool, going down the shore, and camp. But as always, our crafty kids bring lots of creativity to this busy season.

Commissioner Thomas J. Evans' Endowment Contribution to the Nutley Public Library

n May 9, Commissioner Thomas J. Evans, alongside his adult children, visited the Nutley Free Public Library to make a significant contribution to the Yolanda Perrotta Evans Endowment Fund. Yolanda, a lifelong Nutley resident, was deeply involved in the community, contributing to various local organizations, including the Boy Scouts of America and the Nutley Music Boosters Association. The fund has made it possible for the library to purchase books and materials that are enjoyed and will continue to be enjoyed by children and future generations of children in our community. What a lasting legacy!"

"Commissioner Evans has been a long-time supporter of the library, and we appreciate everything he has done over the years, particularly in establishing the Yolanda Perrotta Evans Fund, which continues to enrich our children's collections significantly," said Anthony lannarone, Nutley Library's long-time former president. lannarone had established the endowment funds that were created through resolutions that he personally prepared in collaboration with donors.

Beat the Summer Heat with a Free Trip To a Museum

t can be difficult these days to find something to do on the weekend that isn't expensive and can entertain a variety of ages and lifestyles. Even a trip to the movies with a friend can easily set you back \$50 or more! Fortunately, thanks to the tireless work of the Friends of the Library, Nutley Public Library has a robust museum pass lending program. Nutley cardholders can visit several interesting and fun museums for free, which is a nice break considering other costs for your trip like transportation and food.

Nutley Public Library offers passes to the American Museum of Natural History, the Intrepid Museum, the Newark Museum of Art, the Storm King Art Center, and the Yogi Berra Museum & Learning Center. They can be borrowed by any adult Nutley Library cardholder on a first come, first served basis and cannot be reserved ahead of time.

We encourage you to call ahead to the library at 973-667-0405 to find out if the pass you're interested in is currently available and to find out how many individuals the pass covers (e.g. 2 adults plus 2 children, 2 adults only, etc.). Passes are lent out for 7 days, are unavailable for renewal, and there is a one month waiting period to borrow the same pass again.

We also encourage you to check your intended museum's website beforehand to make sure they are open when you plan to go and if they have a timed entry or mask requirement. While you are browsing there, it's always a good idea to click on their exhibitions page in case they are hosting a limited time program that you might want to see. For example, the Intrepid Museum is presently hosting an exhibition about the history of the Apollo moon missions that will close around Labor Day weekend.

Nutley Public Library's museum passes are particularly sought after during the summer, so we strongly encourage you to call ahead at 973-667-0405 as they are extremely limited in quantity. We hope you have a great time and be sure to tell us all about your trip when you return!

Overcoming the Challenges of ADHD Begins with Greater Awareness A PAMILY SE

ccording to the CDC, about 6 million BUREA children ages 3-17, or nearly 10 percent of kids, have been diagnosed with attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder (ADHD). In fact, a study from RegisteredNursing.org found that "ADHD symptoms" is the most searched mental health concern in the U.S. on Google.

Let's discuss what ADHD is and is not, common symptoms, and steps you can take if you notice these symptoms in your child.

ADHD is a neurodevelopmental disorder that is typically diagnosed in childhood but can continue into adulthood. There are three types.

Hyperactive-impulsive ADHD involves excessive movements, restlessness, and impulsiveness (talking excessively, difficulty sitting still). Inattentive ADHD involves difficulty with focus, inattentiveness, and distractibility (doesn't follow instructions, careless with schoolwork or behavior). Combined ADHD includes symptoms of both hyperactive-impulsive and inattentive ADHD and is the most common type.

It's important to understand that this is not a disorder of intelligence. Children with this condition often perform well in school. Also, ADHD should not be dismissed as laziness, which can cause a child to feel rejected or depressed, making the situation worse. Finally, ADHD should not be blamed on poor parenting, which has never been proven to cause this condition.

Because symptoms of ADHD are similar to other conditions in preschool children, it's a good idea to see a developmental psychiatrist or neurologist for a diagnosis. In elementary school, an evaluation can usually be performed through the school, which can then provide accommodation if needed. Medication may be prescribed and when taken correctly, is perfectly safe and will not change the personality of the child or cause addiction.

There are also coping skills that may reduce ADHD symptoms. Improving organization and time management with a calendar or even sticky notes can help children stay on track with school and home tasks. Because people with ADHD notice changes in patterns, alternating the colors of paper and calendar items can maintain their interest and attention.

Counseling can help children with ADHD understand the underlying causes of their thoughts, emotions, and behaviors without judgment or pressure. With greater self-awareness, counselors can then determine what process, coping mechanisms, and timeline will help children achieve success and balance.

Although ADHD can be a challenging condition that won't go away on its own, children are often very intelligent and go on to live happy, fulfilling lives. The key is to build awareness and understanding of ADHD and develop a personalized treatment plan that enables each child to succeed and thrive.
