
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Merry December

From Europe to New Jersey ...

Why Three Great Artists **Pursued Their** Artistic **Vision from Paris to Nutley**

f you were an artist living in Paris, why would you ever leave and move to Nutley? That question might seem puzzling, since Paris has long been

regarded as the artistic capital of the world. But the fact is, at least three important American painters did exactly that. Let's find out why.

FRANK FOWLER (1852-1910)

Fowler was born in Brooklyn, but headed to Europe to study painting when he was in his twenties. He studied in Florence and then Paris, where he helped paint the murals in the palace in the Luxembourg Gardens. He returned to America in about 1882, took a studio in New York, but soon purchased an old home on the Enclosure in Nutley and built a large studio on the back. (The house now bears the street number 16 Enclosure.)

Fowler painted extensive murals for the ballroom of the old Waldorf Astoria Hotel, which were destroyed when the Empire State Building was built.



FREDERICK DANA MARSH (1872-1961)

Marsh was born in Chicago, where he studied at the Art Institute. Like Fowler, he headed to Paris to continue his studies. While there, he married Alice Randall, another Chicago-born artist. They had two sons, James and Reginald. Then in about 1901, he moved the family back to America and bought Frank Fowler's studio home on The Enclosure.

Marsh created his most ambitious mosaic murals, "Maritime History of the Hudson" for the Hotel McAlpin in New York, which at the time was the largest hotel in the world. When the hotel was converted to apartments in 1976,

the mosaics were moved to the Fulton Street (Broadway/ Nassau) subway station, where you can still see them today. Marsh also designed posters that were sold to support American troops during World War I.

His sons went on to become artists. Reginald, one of the most important American artists of the last century, painted the murals in the New York City Customs House (now the Museum of the American Indian) in lower Manhattan. James became a highly accomplished metallic artist. Among many projects, he created elegant metal gates for the entrance of Sarah Lawrence College in Bronxville, New York. And both those boys grew up in Nutley.

MICHAEL LENSON (1903-1971)

My father, Michael Lenson, grew up in New York, but



studied in Paris from 1928-1932. Upon his return to America, he supervised mural activity in New Jersey for the WPA. You can see his murals in City Hall and Weequahic High School in Newark, as well as in a post office in Mount Hope, West Virginia. His work is in many major American museums.


Lenson, like Fowler and Marsh, found his way to Nutley. He was living in Newark but while strolling by the Mudhole in 1941, he looked toward the Enclosure and saw an artist's studio. When he found out that the studio and its attached home were for sale, he bought the place, moved in, and continued to live and

paint there in Nutley until he died in 1971.

That house happened to be the same place that had belonged to Frank Fowler and Frederick Dana Marsh. Yes, those three famous artists left Paris and ended up in Nutley. Even then, something about our town was magically appealing to people with creative minds.

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Fire Department Signaling Systems: 1897 – Present

any decades of development and fires have challenged us with how to summon our firefighters in an emergency. Church bells, patrols with rattles, steam whistles and word-of-mouth worked, but were slow. Nutley acquired a train wheel from the railroad in 1894 and Chief Van Riper had a tower built to house the wheel and amplify the sound when it was banged with a hammer. We all have read stories of the Pony Express delivering messages across the country and being replaced by telegraph lines. Nutley experienced similar events with the reporting of fire by horseback and foot being modernized with a fire alarm telegraph system in 1897. The Fire Department began installing a Gamewell Municipal Fire Alarm System in strategic locations and by 1906 had one hundred and seventeen call boxes across the town.

The first call boxes were key-activated so only authorized people could access the switch and the police would respond first to verify alarms before turning out the firefighters. The town continued to upgrade the system with new copper wire in 1904 and 1919, a superintendent of alarms in 1921, a whistle on the Nichols Hat Factory, storm resistant components and power supply, along with additional call boxes that everyone could activate.

The system's functional matrix was quite involved starting with the key-wound spring and relay box on telephone poles, connected to a fog horn on buildings, bells in the firehouses, and a ticker-tape-like device for recording the unique number for each call box. Firefighters







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would look at a chart, determine the location based on the numbers being tapped and respond accordingly. Master boxes would be installed at schools and factories to connect their alarm systems directly to the fire department. Longtime residents may remember the 6pm test of the foghorn every night. Telephones began appearing in 1930 at the firehouses and around town so the system was already being supplemented by more modern devices. The police continued to monitor signals until the fire department watch room was established in 1952. Mary Piro told her daughter Susan Farr of hearing fire horns and chasing firetrucks, interrupting many a dinner, to "follow a handsome flame."

Fire Chief Andrew Hutch in 1945

declared the Gamewell system obsolete, since it mainly produced false alarms, especially after the bars let out. He felt telephone information lead to more precise response of equipment and manpower. One false alarm was turned

in by an Irish immigrant in 1949 when he tried to mail a letter and activated the alarm instead. His one-year jail sentence was avoided when he told the judge, "Mailboxes are red and fire boxes are green in Ireland!" The system was upgraded with an Electron unit in 1960, allowing for bells in firefighter's homes and businesses. The outmoded Gamewell system became costly to maintain and was removed in 1987.

The next phase of signaling was the Plectron system in 1976 using portable receivers and radio transmissions. The 9-1-1 telephone system was installed in 1979 and the township returned to centralized monitoring. The next upgrade was pagers in 1987, so the firefighters could be con-


tacted anywhere. The 9-1-1 system continues to evolve, determine your address, and may triangulate your cell phone location. Nutley will continue its tradition of rapid response to your call for help.



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Revisiting Nutley's Football State Championship Team 25 Years Later By Michael Stefanelli

This month we celebrate the 25th anniversary of Nutley's only state championship title in football that was won on the playing field. The 1992 Maroon Raiders, recently inducted into Nutley's Athletic Hall of Fame, was a team on a mission that year.

Teams like this are often described as being "many

years in the making" and this large, tight-knit group grew up together forming bonds outside the game, which ultimately led to their very strong goal to win a state championship. As they grew up, they watched a few very good Raiders teams fall short of this goal, like the '88 team that made the states but lost to Randolph. The 1991





team made an improbable turnaround from a year prior, finishing 1-8, and vaulting all the way to a state title game only to fall short to West Morris 14-0. But it was that '91 season championship game where this '92 team cut its teeth and was ready to finally make the ultimate push to absolute victory.

This team came into the season with one of the largest senior groups in memory - 24 seniors. They had all played together for years, many dating back to 7th and 8th grade. This was a group that boasted team chemistry, who

respected and appreciated each other. The moment the final whistle blew on the '91 season they made the decision to be the best they could be and win the state title. That was the expectation and the goal was nothing short of that. Head Coach Rich San Fillipo says, "The

1992 team was very talented but equally important was the fact that they had great camaraderie. Nobody cared who scored, how many carries they had or who was the star, their goal was to win the game." Talent goes a long way, but in sports it's the intangible factors that usually separate the greats from the good ones. "We fought like it was our last breath on every play for each other throughout the season and never craved individual attention,' said senior running back, Don Sellari. "We cared about each other and winning a state championship that would leave a legacy in Nutley sports history that would at least allow us to never be forgotten once we graduated and moved on our separate ways."

Every great team can always point to a few key moments during their run that helped propel them. All of the players' coaches and fans pointed to beating St. Joseph's of Montvale in the fourth game of the season as the moment of validation for them. Their team was a perennial group 4 state power that was ranked 4th in the state at the time and whose roster was filled with players committed to Division 1 colleges.

Nutley carried a 14-7 lead into the fourth guarter and St. Joe's made their push scoring what was to be a game-ty-

> ing touchdown late in the game until the pivotal moment in the game and season occurred. Tom Battoglia came up big, racing around the left side of the line to block the extra point preserving the lead and ultimately sealing the victory. One of the most intense

games everyone participated in their lives for sure. Senior left tackle Ed Graziano reminisced, "We matched them player for player and beat them, which catapulted us to 9th in the state. That win validated our confidence and made everyone take notice." Many Nutley fans that made the trip to that game also took notice by rushing the opposing field to celebrate such a huge victory.

Another key moment for this team was against Hackensack. A hard-fought game on the road, once again, where senior quarterback, Frank DeMaio, ran for a 4-yard touchdown as time expired in the game. With the decision to take the tie or go for the win on the road, coach San Fillipo never wavered from his decision to take the

tie because it meant a #1 seed in the playoffs and home games.

Yes, those of us familiar with high school football today realize that state title games are often played in large venues that host major professional and college sporting events. In 1992, the Raiders got to play for their ultimate prize on their home field in the center of town, in the Oval in front of their fans and on their turf against Morris Knolls. This is the way championship football should be played.

On a cold, crisp, cloudy day, in tighter confines, where the sound of the crowd could come to life from 2,000-plus fans like it was a sold out professional game. You just don't get that same effect from 2,000 fans in a 70,000-seat stadium.

That moment to capture the only champion-ship in the playoff era was here. There wasn't nervousness. There was a quiet confidence from this group where they felt they couldn't be denied due to their experience from the previous year and what they achieved during this '92 season. Quarterback Frank DeMaio remembers, "Everyone came into the locker room that day with the same mindset. Refuse to lose. The energy, the stares across the room, Metallica playing on the speakers, the feeling of no doubts, no fears, and no worries. With the guys in that room, I knew we would be ok that day."

Nutley was slightly favored in the game with local area writers picking them for a slim-mar-

gined victory. Turning the ball over on its first two possessions in the game, and surrendering a 97-yard drive to fall behind 6-0, Nutley truly showed its grit, determination and poise that had been built from all of their experience through the years. About to fall behind two scores early in the game, the Raider defense, a dominant unit all year long, came up with a huge stop and fumble recovery deep in their own end and this set the tone for the rest of the game.





The Nutley offensive line, a considerably larger and powerful unit for a high school team imposed their will right away like they did all year long springing Don Sellari for an 87-yard touchdown to take an early 2nd quarter lead. After that, it was methodical, and the execution was perfect the rest of the game. Nutley carried out its game plan and started to impose their will on their opponent. They scored 39 unanswered points and all that was left was the opening of the south end zone gates of the oval to let in the students, faculty, football alumni, and fans to rush the field for what seemed like a timeless celebration.

25 YEARS LATER ...

ED GRAZIANO

"It's hard to believe it's been 25 years. At the time it was such a euphoric feeling to see all the hard work you put in for months pay off in a championship. It's a feeling of accomplishment that can never be taken away from us. It's a source of pride even now. For most of us, it was the pinnacle of our football careers, as we didn't play on the next level. We went out on top! Can't ask for much more than that. All these years later I don't see many of the guys too often if at all. But when I do, there's always that look, head nod or conversation that says, yeah we sure did kick some butt together back in '92."

COACH RICH SAN FILLIPO

"How far this team came. From 1-8 in 1990 to a state championship appearance in 1991 to a championship

title in 1992 achieved playing against the best competition in NJ. Truly a unique group of athletes and outstanding people. I really believe the standards set by this group allowed us to play for a third state championship in 1995."

DON SELLARI

"We made sure to maximize everything we did together as a group and it resulted in an awesome experience that forged lifelong friendships and memories that will last forever."

FRANK DEMAIO

"We are part of Nutley Football history, nothing or no one can ever take that away. I can get together with anyone from that team and still today talk about that season. Those days are still crystal clear in my head. Our team was unlike most other teams, which is why it is still special to me today. Not one person ever had doubt that we would have the outcome we did. It was not wished for, it was not hoped for, rather it was expected and we would not settle for less. 25 years later my own son is playing in the same jersey number I did, on the same playing field, with yet another shot at a title. Time will tell, but hoping to be able to have him feel all the same emotions my team got to share 25 years ago."



Neil Frazer United States Navy (1962-1984)


hen I sit on my blanket, on the soft grains of sand on the Wildwood Crest beach, and look out onto the Atlantic Ocean, where the dark surface glistens in the sun, I sometimes wonder what it would be like to serve on a mighty ship in the United States Navy. Fortunately, I have an uncle who means the world to me and who did just that, and was able to recall his honorable time served under the American flag for our great nation.

Neil Frazer is one of the kindest, loving, respected, loyal, and highly intelligent individuals that you will ever encounter. His understanding of how things work, especially in the mechanical sense, is outstanding as it is impressive. He holds a Bachelor of Science in Electrical Engineering with a Minor in Nuclear Physics from George Mason University. His love of ships is only outdone by his love of trains, both real as well as model, and how they function from the smallest of miniature parts to the overall creation. Uncle Neil enlisted in

the United Sates Navy and retired with the rank of lieutenant 22 years after a distinguished and dedicated service. He served with pride from 1962 till 1984, and served on many ships such as the USS Thomas W Snowden, the USS Sagacity, which was a mine sweeper, the USS Venture which was also a mine sweeper, the USS Koelsch which was a high-speed destroyer, and the USS Saipan which was an assault carrier.

He served on the USS Brister during the Vietnam War and explained what that experience was like.

"The USS Brister was a destroyer, which had a 10-cylinder 20-piston engine that was very reliable," he said. "It was a diesel engine which was a Fairbanks-Morse engine, the same engine used in trains such as the Pennsylvania

and Jersey Central. During my time in Vietnam, we would sail along the coast, better known as market time patrol, stopping and inspecting ships for weapons. North Vietnam had no navy, but used smaller ships to transport weapons since it was nearly impossible to transport on land. The British were still trading with Vietnam, and so we would inspect their cargo just to make sure everything was on the up and up."

He recalls a particularly dangerous event: "One day at 5:30 in the morning, we hailed a ship that did not answer our call to pull over and receive inspection. They quickly beached the ship onto land, and then ran off into the jungle. We sent a search party towards the ship and as they came upon it, they were fired at with a 50-caliber machine gun. Our men returned to our ship and thank God they did. The ship we were going to inspect was booby-trapped and exploded into a million pieces. Later, in the scattered debris, we had discovered Russian made rifles and claymore mines littering the coast."

"My primary duty on the ship was radar," he explains. The ship's primary duty, besides inspection, was to move Marines from point to point as they were needed. An interesting fact about the USS Brister was its ability to sink the back of the ship 18 feet into the water. This would allow a landing craft to ride up into the ship, and a monorail overhead would distribute supplies to the LCU's where they would back out and resupply the Marines that were fighting on land. Our ship would then stay as a

hospital, have the ability to supply parts, and act in a military support fashion."

Uncle Neil explained how a minesweeper worked. "The minesweepers at the time were wooden hulled. We had nonmagnetic engines, diesel engines with aluminum blocks. There was a machine on board with a sensor system that would induce a current in reverse to make the ship magnetically zero. The ship would have to pass over a magnetic mine before it could destroy it. We would then drag behind what looked like a rake with metal claws. This is the apparatus that would make the mine explode."

We talked a great deal more on all aspects of military life. On how powdered eggs and pancakes were a staple in one's diet. How he was one of the few people to receive a Golden Shellback, a rare status for a sailor who has crossed the Equator at the International Date Line (00.00 N and 00.00 E).

I would like to personally thank you for your service, Mustang Lieutenant Neil S Frazer, and for your contribution to your country.

Nutley Family Service Bureau: Winter Holiday Food Initiative





The Superintendent of Nutley **Public Schools:** Dr. Julie Glazer

How do you describe your job?

Being the superintendent is like being Chief Executive Officer of a company. I report to the board, manage the budget, oversee approximately 450 employees, and am committed to our product: excellent education for all of Nutley's students.



I am so fortunate to work with a board who is committed to enhancing education for all students whether general education, special education, college or career-bound. Our teachers are passionate and consistently go above and beyond for each student in the district. The smiles from the students make my day.





What other organizations, associations, and non-profits are you associated with?

I am a member of the Nutley Rotary, a Trustee of the Library Board and try to attend the events and programs of each of the town organization's events. On any given day you may see me at Unico, Third Half Club, VFW, The Nutley Family Service Bureau, walking for Thriving Survivors or the John H. Walker Foundation, attending a PTO meeting or one of the many booster club programs.

Are there any challenges you face in your role that you want readers to know about?

When I joined the district in

July 2016, the board and previous administrations had already been grappling with overcrowding in the schools for years. One of the first things I was required to do was to add trailers at Yantacaw and Washington schools to accommodate students. Additionally, I had to add class sections, deny variances to attend other schools, and divert new students registering to the district from their home schools. This has continued into this school year. Class sizes have continued to rise at every school, and we are using every available space for instruction, even those not initially intended for instruction. At the high school, we even have to use hallway space for physical education. These are meant to be temporary solutions. Without adding instructional space to Yantacaw and Washington elementary schools, the John Walker Middle School and Nutley High School, we will continue to be at space capacity, will be facing a soft re-districting to manage space utilization and class size, and by 2021 will need to add additional trailers.

We have looked at every solution put forth for meeting these challenges including identifying possible space and the cost for building a new school, and combining grade levels at current schools. None of these have proven to be viable. Working with a team of architects, the commissioners, bond attorney and financial advisor, the board and I have proposed possible construction projects that are meant to be a 15-20 year solution. The commissioners purchased the Davis Property (Nutley Bike Shop) for the specific purpose of adding on to John H. Walker Middle School to bring the Grade 6 students over and free up class room space in each elementary school building. Unfortunately, just doing this one project is not enough to resolve the district-wide capacity issue. The Board of Education has resolved to move forward with a referendum to ask the community to allow them to bond for the money necessary to complete each of the projects including those at Yantacaw, Washington, and NHS.

Not only will a positive outcome for the referendum on December 12th resolve our space issues, including the removal of all current trailers, our Grade 6-8 students will

realize the many benefits of participating in an authentic middle school model and course offerings can continue to be enhanced allowing us to even better prepare students for college and career.





Today, Dominick's daughter Julie leads one of


