Spring Garden Elementary School has a beautification project they are working on. It involves personalized bricks!







While their family is indeed one of the treasures in their lives, they have all bonded over a special connection to the veteran community.



Van Riper House Awarded \$9,634 Historic Site Management Grant: Major Progress for Nonprofit Organization

he New Jersey Historic Trust voted to recommend a Historic Site Management Grant in the amount of \$9,634 to Van Riper House, Inc. at their annual meeting held on September 25. The funds will be used for the preparation of nominations to the New Jersey and National Registers of Historic Places for the Van Riper House, an 18th century Dutch farmhouse in dire need of restoration, located in Nutley, New Jersey.

The balance of the plan's total estimated cost of \$12,845 will be funded by monies the organization has on hand in accordance with the grant's three-to-one matching provision. The grant award represents another major milestone in the organization's progress since its reorganization in 2019. It is the culmination of countless hours of volunteer work encompassing major fundraising, strategic planning, and grassroots community

The proposed nominations will be developed by Hunter Research, Inc., New Jersey's premier investigative history firm, led by Principal Architectural Historian Patrick Harshbarger. Hunter Research's strengths in the area of nomination preparation are the result of the firm's more than 30 years of working in New Jersey, during which they have gained an intimate knowledge of how the listing process works.

The nominations will benefit from findings of a Preservation Plan developed by Hunter for the house over the last two years, also funded in part by a trust grant. Listing on the registers will avail our organization to capital funds for major restoration projects and is a key

component of the Plan's proposed project schedule. Final acceptance of the nominations is expected to take 18

If listed, the Van Riper House will join the Nutley Museum, Kingsland Manor, former Women's Club (Vreeland House), and the Enclosure Historic District on the New Jersey and National Registers.

Our organization thanks those who wrote letters of support for the grant application, and our many donors and fundraiser attendees who helped raise the matching funds. \blacksquare

Yanticaw Park History

utley is known for the park system following the scenic Third River through the Township. Stretching from Harrison Street to Kingsland Street, it's our local version of manifest destiny. The vision started in 1895 when John R. Clark and Dr. Thomas E. Satterthwaite created a map of proposed parklands and began an intense lobbying effort with Nutley and Essex County commissioners to appropriate monies and acquire land.

The previous uses of this area included farmland, town dump, and the Yantico Cotton Mill. The Old Military Hall was nearby, and no doubt Nutley's militia groups used this area for drill grounds. Stitts mill owners built a meeting room for the Dutch Reformed Church. The Vincent Methodist Episcopal Church started construction of their new structure in 1909,

while The Bank of Nutley built their first building on Chestnut St. in 1910, further spurring the park planners to action.

The small town of Franklin, soon to be renamed Nutley, could not afford to preserve so much land and developers were already encroaching on the envisioned park project. Leaders saw other parks being developed by Essex County

and wanted Nutley to get the same benefit from county tax payments.

Charles Vroom and The Nutley Improvement Association joined the efforts, and in 1909, the first county appropriations bill included \$40K for land purchase and \$200K for development of 29 acres. The name Yanticaw stems from the Lenni-Lenape words meaning "place of the wood boundary" and an early Native American ceremonial dance of thanksgiving called Yantacaw.

The land was purchased in 1911, and following an Olmsted Brothers design, construction was completed by 1914. Wetlands were drained, walking paths, terracing, stairways, footbridges, and a dam created a scenic lake area. Amenities included a playground with swings, seesaws, sandbox, and wading pool in the lower section known as Girl's Park. The upper section, known as Boy's Park, included ball fields, a wonderful

stand of European Lindens lining the pathways, lawn tennis, lawn bowling courts, horseshoe pits, a field house with showers, lockers, bathrooms, and band shell.

A great storm in 1962 damaged the lake and a plan funded by land sales to the NJ Highway Authority was implemented to remove the dam, drain the lake, add 850 feet of retaining walls, and reclaim recreational land.

The Lanape Trail that connects 18 parks and 11 towns passes through the park. The legend of Alligator Island was confirmed in a 1925 news article about Fire Chief Zimmerman lassoing a two-foot alligator in the river. High school sports teams, bands, twirlers, and gym classes use the park extensively. Gold medal Olympian Ollan Cassell

> trained in this park. An outdoor classroom envisioned by the Walker Middle School Science Department was built for the students.

A recent history walk by Town Historian John Demmer and myself will be recreated indoors on March 18, 2025, at the Nutley Library. Featured will be pictures, some not seen publicly for decades, Demmer's vast postcard collection, and information and images from other local historical sources.
