## **Nutley Family Service Bureau: Pantry Resource** for Food Insufficiency By Emma Cortese, NFSB Trustee

utley Family Service Bureau, Inc. (NFSB) is a local nonprofit mental health and social service organization working tirelessly to help our clients during the current pandemic crisis. Our Food Pantry is focused particularly on food insecurity at this time. The US Department of Agriculture defines food insecurity as "limited or uncertain availability of nutritionally adequate and safe foods." Such insecurity can manifest in various ways along a continuum, from anxiety that food will run out before more can be purchased, to reduced size and/ or quality of meals, to missing them altogether.

A recent report issued by The Community Food Bank of New Jersey highlighted the impact of the pandemic on increasing food insecurity across all socio-economic strata. The number of residents across the state who are struggling with hunger is projected to rise by nearly 60% as a direct result of COVID-19, 10% higher than the national average. Closer to home, Essex County had the highest food insecurity rate pre-pandemic and remains among the highest. It is in this environment that NFSB continues to be a community resource.

The Pantry impact numbers for 2020 reflect our responsiveness: number of households served has increased by 30%, including 350 households and 700 individuals served. We dispense groceries on a routine basis: on site at 169 Chestnut St. every other week alternating with deliveries to residents at Parkside Apartments and the Nutley Senior Manor. Despite increased demands, the Pantry has maintained high-value food staples including shelf-stable essentials such as canned tuna, beans, peanut butter, rice, cereal and pasta; a selection of fresh produce, dairy, eggs, and meat proteins are often available.

In addition to the mounting numbers, the landscape of food insecurity is changing. Temporary or episodic food insecurity is a stark reality for many households which never have faced such circumstances. Unexpected job loss or reduced income due to COVID-19 has forced budgetary trade-offs wherein essential expenses such as utility bills, car payments, and rent may compete with food purchases.

Katherine Carmichael, Executive Director, emphasizes "The NFSB Pantry is always open to meet the needs of a township member in crisis, may it be, for example, a loss of employment, domestic violence, medical debilitation, or fire. Additionally, anyone in Nutley who already receives Medicaid, Supplemental Security Income (SSI), Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) for Women, Infants and Children (WIC) and/or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) qualifies." Ever aware of prevailing township socio-economic factors, our Food Pantry participation criteria have reflected the higher cost of living locally and set the enrollment threshold accordingly.

The NFSB Food Pantry is an inclusive environment, which

guards client confidentiality and respects personal privacy. Pantry personnel assist with the enrollment process which has minimal administrative requirements and can additionally provide help in navigating government programs. Peg Conca, Food Pantry and Thrift Shop manager, emphasizes the Pantry's accessibility, "Individuals who find themselves in need of our services can walk in to start the process. Emergency situations are never turned away." For inquiries about how to participate in the NFSB Food Pantry program, call 973-667-1884 ext. 2 or go to www.nutleyfamily.org/food-pantry. In-person inquiries can be made Monday through Friday, 9am to 5pm.

The mission of NFSB is to strengthen the emotional and social well-being of individuals and families through affordable counseling and social service programs. The support of community partners such as municipal, business, civic, and religious organizations, as well as generous township residents, has enabled NFSB operations to continue, even during this time of pandemic crisis. #### A Tribute

## Jack Suffren: A Coach, Teacher, Friend, and Faithful Mentor to Students at Nutley High School By Michael C. Gabriele

uring his career of more than four decades as an educator at Nutley High School, John Edward "Jack" Suffren touched the lives of many students-inside and outside of the classroom. He was a beloved math teacher who retired in 2003. Most notably, he was an inspirational coach for the Nutley High School wrestling team-helping to launch the program as a varsity sport in the early 1960s.

Suffren passed away on Nov. 16, 2020, at Clara Maass Medical Center in Belleville at the age of 86. Many in town mourned him, especially members of the Nutley High School wrestling teams from the 1960s. But while these men reflected on their fond memories, they didn't speak much about their years in the wrestling program. Rather, they reminisced about Suffren as a mentor, a friend, and an enduring source of inspiration in their lives.

Wrestling is a rigorous sport that demands strength, skill, and mental toughness. Bonding between teammates and coaches occurs through long, intensive hours of training and the ups and downs of competition. The former Nutley wrestlers, now living in different parts of the country, shared the life lessons they learned from Suffren.

"Suff was like a big brother," said Art Zinicola, NHS class of 1967, who wrestled in the heavyweight slot. Zinicola recalled when Suffren invited a number of the wrestlers to spend a weekend with him at his parents' home in Wilkes Barre, Pennsylvania. "His mom and dad treated us like gold. There were no special events. It was just a fun weekend; lots of cookies and cake."

Zinicola, who lives in Kansas, also spoke about occasional Friday night pizza parties at Suffren's home in Nutley. "Eight or 10 of us would show up. We'd eat pizza, play cards, and watch TV. We all had a good time, but looking back on it, I think what Suff really wanted to do was keep us out of trouble."

Ray Ritacco, NHS class of 1967, said "Suff had a way of putting you in a good frame of mind. He introduced us to the aspect that it's not all size and strength that matters, but equally important is your mental preparation. He inspired me and gave me confidence to be a better wrestler. You didn't want to disappoint him."

As part of that inspiration and motivation, Suffren often shared a poem with his wrestlers titled "It's All in the State of Mind" by Walter D. Wintle, published in 1905. The last verse of the poem reads:

> Life's battles don't always go To the stronger or faster man But sooner or later the person who wins Is the one who thinks he can

Ritacco carried that inspirational message with him to West Point Military Academy in upstate New York, where he graduated in 1972, earned the distinguished "Army Athletic Award," and was inducted into the West Point Hall of Fame. Today, Ritacco resides in California. Ted Olivo, another member of the NHS class of 1967, said Ritacco and Zinicola were his best buddies on the wrestling team. They were also teammates on the Maroon Raider football squad. "You could go to Suff if you ever needed help with anything," Olivo said. "He was a good man, and he wanted his students to be good people."

Suffren instilled a strong sense of confidence, positive thinking, and persistence in all the members of the wrestling team, according to Doug Cunningham, NHS class of 1966. Suffren had a major influence in Cunningham's career; so much so that Cunningham served for 17 years as the head wrestling coach at Cinnaminson High School, located in Burlington County, NJ.

Cunningham recalled that Suffren, as an astute math teacher, "wrote on the blackboard at the speed of a machine gun." Cunningham, who lives in Virginia, served in the Marine Corps and then studied at Fairleigh Dickinson University.

"Teaching was his life," Ralph Cardinale, NHS class of 1969, said of Suffren, who was Cardinale's coach and math teacher. "He was in Nutley for over 40 years. He always tried to help people. That's just the kind of guy he was." Cardinale, who resides in Lafayette, NJ, was a district wrestling champ in 1968 and 1969.

Nutley resident Carmen LoRe, NHS class of 1965, first participated in wrestling when it started as a club sport in the fall of 1961. (Full disclosure: LoRe is a relative of this reporter). Barrie Beaver served as the head coach of the squad, which was elevated to a varsity sport in 1962, and Suffren assisted him. "Beaver and Suff were both math teachers at Nutley High School and they became good friends," LoRe said. "The team had a big learning curve, because we would compete against schools that had established wrestling programs. It was hard, but we all learned together."

The dedication paid off. Nutley soon gained a reputation of having a strong, competitive wrestling program. Beaver retired mid-1970s and Suffren took over as head coach. He coached John Monaco, who won the NJSIAA State Championship in 1981. (Barrie Beaver died on July 11, 2016 at the age of 76 at Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center in New York City.)

LoRe attended Minot State University, North Dakota, on a football and wrestling scholarship. Returning to New Jersey, he accepted a position as a physical education teacher and assistant wrestling coach at West Milford High School and also went into the construction business. In the early 1990s, Nutley established a recreation wrestling program for junior high school students as a feeder system for the high school team–a program LoRe and Angelo Cifelli had long lobbied the town to install.

He coached the rec team for several years, then was asked by the township Board of Education to go to NHS "for a few weeks" to be an assistant coach and work with the young wrestlers he helped develop. Those few weeks quickly evolved into the head coaching position. LoRe led the program from 1994 to 2007. During that time, under his leadership, the team garnered 107 victories, along with many individual district and regional champs. LoRe said his biggest thrill as a coach was when Michael Bonora placed sixth and then first in the NCAA Division 3 national tournament held in Iowa.

"Suff was always honest with you and always there to support you," LoRe said. "He taught us to stay in control and stay positive. When I was coaching the team, he would come to the matches to cheer us on." In May 2017, Suffren, LoRe, and Cardinale were featured speakers at a gathering at the Nutley Museum, sponsored by the Nutley Historical Society, to honor the town's history of wrestling.

During his later years, while still residing in Nutley, Suffren became an author, publishing three books. He also used his musical skills as a piano player to entertain local charitable organizations and nursing home residents.

Suffren was deeply religious man and a member of the Methodist church where he grew up in Wanamie, PA. Interviewed in the January 2018 edition of *Nutley Neighbors* magazine, Suffren spoke about his faith and his philosophy of life: lifting up those who have fallen; being kind in word and deed; and making the pathways smooth for others, to help them succeed. He had the wisdom, courage and strength to make a difference in the lives of many people.

Well done, Jack Suffren. You were a faithful mentor to generations of students in Nutley. ■

## Close to Home ... Where You Can See Murals by Nutley's Greatest Muralists

You have probably heard that there was once an artists' colony located on a street called The Enclosure in Nutley. And I am here to let

you know that is true. I should know, I grew up on the street. My father, Michael Lenson, was an artist who lived and painted on The Enclosure from 1941 until he died in 1971.

The Enclosure has been home to many well-known artists, who in many cases were highly accomplished mural painters. The first of them was a painter named Frank Fowler, who moved to the street in about 1880 from Paris where he had helped to paint the murals in the Medici Palace in the Luxembourg Gardens. They're still there. After his return to the U.S., he painted more murals in locations that included the old Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, now destroyed, that sat where

the Empire State Building is now. After Fowler left The Enclosure in about 1900, his studio at what is now 16 Enclosure was bought by Frederick Dana Marsh, another painter who created murals, including some mosaic murals that were installed in the McAlpin Hotel on Union Square in New York in 1913. The McAlpin was considered the most luxurious hotel in the world at the time. When it was converted into an apartment building in the 1930s, the murals were saved and are now installed in a public

place in New York.

Where? Be patient, I will tell you in a moment. But let me also share with you the fact that Marsh had a son named Reginald, who grew up on The Enclosure and went on to become one of the most respected artists in America.

Then we come to my father, Michael Lenson (1903-1971), who lived on The Enclosure for the last 30 years of his life.

In his book *Art in America,* the art historian William Gerdts called him "New Jersey's most important muralist." And that is almost certainly true. He was director of mural installations for FDR's Federal Arts Project for the state of New Jersey, and you can still go see his murals today. Where? I will tell you in just a moment.

But let me share a curious fact. The most visible mural in Nutley, *The Return of Annie Oakley* that is in our post office, was not painted by an artist from Nutley! It was painted by an artist named Paul Chapman, who lived on Long Island. So ... go figure.

But now we get to the good stuff - a list of murals by Enclosure artists that you can easily go and see for yourself.

Maritime Mosaic Murals by FREDERICK DANA MARSH, Now Located in the Fulton Street/William Street Subway Station in New York After they were removed from the McAlpin Hotel, they were saved and moved to this subway station, where commuters pass by them every day. Because they were located in a restaurant called the Marine Grill in the hotel, they all show nautical scenes – and they are spectacular.

Murals by REGINALD MARSH In The National Museum of the American Indian (New York) Between 1936 and 1937, Reginald Marsh painted a series of spectacular frescoes

in what was then the U.S. Customs House, located at 1 Bowling Green, in lower Manhattan. The building is now a museum. It's just north of the Battery and an easy walk from the World Trade Center site. You can still see these murals today - and believe me, they are worth the trip.

#### Murals by My Father, MICHAEL LENSON, in Newark

My father painted the eight-panel History of Newark murals located in the City Council Chambers in Newark City Hall. (Call the Newark City Clerk's office to schedule an appointment to see them.) He also painted *The Enlightenment of Man* murals in the lobby of Weequahic High School on Chancellor Avenue. And if you're in the mood for a real road trip, head to Mount Hope, West Virginia, where my father's mural *Mining* can be found in the U.S. Post Office. Also, through the end of January 2021, a study for that *Mining* mural is on display in the *Vida Americana* exhibition in the Whitney Museum in New York. My dad was a big deal. I am proud of him.

Nutley played a major role in the history of American art! Did it ever! I'd encourage you to go visit these murals and to let your heart swell with pride as you stand before these contributions that Nutley has made!
