

## Nutley Velodrome's 85th Anniversary

uthor Michael Gabriele will present a program on Monday, June 4, 7 pm at the Nutley Museum, 65 Church Street, to mark the 85th anniversary of the opening of the legendary Nutley Velodrome. The event is free and open to the public.

Eighty-five years ago, the world's top professional bike riders came to Nutley to compete at the velodrome. The cycling track opened on Sunday, June 4, 1933, before a standing-room-only crowd of 12,000 cycling fans. The velodrome was located on Park Avenue, occupying an area where the present-day Little League field and the township's Parks and Public Properties building sits.

Joseph Miele, an entrepreneur from East Orange, stepped forward

to fill the void left by the Newark Velodrome, which closed on Sept. 21, 1930. Professional cycling, a popular spectator sport in Newark for more than 40 years, saw its fan base sharply decline during the late 1920s. Miele thought a new velodrome in Nutley would rejuvenate the bike

Miele signed the sport's top athletes to compete on opening day, a world-class field of racers that included Gerard Debaets of Belgium, Alfred Letourner of France, Franz Deulberg of Germany, Giovanni Manera of Italy, Charlie Jaeger of Newark and Paul Croley of Brooklyn. Other top riders included Norman Hill, the California speedster, Australians Cecil Walker and Reggie

McNamara, Newark's Tino Reboli and an amateur rider from Nutley named Martin Journey.

Famed U.S. rider and Olympian Victor Hopkins made his debut at the track on June 7, 1933-the first Wednesday night race at the velodrome, which drew over

7,000 fans. International sprint champion and Newark native Bill Honeman, wearing his eye-catching "Stars and Stripes" racing outfit, made his first appearance on June 14, 1933, winning the one-mile pro race.

The Nutley Velodrome's first season had an overall attendance of 297,000 for 35 meets, with \$60,000 paid out in prizes and salaries. The saucer's second season, which opened Sunday, April 1, 1934, was highlighted by news that veteran Canadian champion William "Torchy" Peden and Italian star Franco Georgetti had signed to

Nutley's homegrown fan favorite, Martin Journey, competed at the Nutley track many times. Journey made his



professional debut at the track on June 5, 1935. He was a rising star and in mid-September 1937 Journey traveled to Australia to continue his promising racing career. He died unexpectedly from a heart disorder in Melbourne on Nov. 26, 1937. Another Nutley resident, Ray Blum-who later represented the United States as a speed skater at 1948 Winter Olympics in St. Moritz, Switzerland–made his first appearance at the velodrome on April 14, 1935 and won the one-mile novice event.

The velodrome enjoyed success during its first two seasons, but by 1935 the fan base declined, much like it did at the Newark track. On Sept. 15, 1940 the Nutley Velodrome closed for the last time. The golden era of U.S. velodrome cycling had come to an end and the track was demolished in February 1942.

The Nutley Velodrome was all but forgotten in the decades that followed, but the town recaptured some of its cycling glory in May 1972 with the Tour of Nutley criterium. Championed by the late Nutley Commissioner Frank A. Cocchiola, along with Peloton Sports Inc. and the Nutley Bicycle Club, the road race drew top international bicycle riders. The Nutley tour lasted until the mid-1980s.

Gabriele is a member of the executive board of the Nutley Historical Society. In 2011 he wrote a book titled The Golden Age of Bicycle Racing in New Jersey, published by The History Press, which detailed the history of professional bicycle racing in the **Garden State.**

## Help! I Want to Retire, but I'm Off Track!

ometime around the age of 50, we start to think more seriously about retirement. #### **PROTECTION**

If you have a spouse or dependents, ask yourself what would become of them if anything were to happen to you. You need to protect their future. Often, when one spouse dies, the survivor's cost of living remains nearly the same. Think about it: the mortgage and taxes still need to be paid, food needs to be bought, electricity needs to stay on, and things you used to do must now be hired out to someone else. Yet, the surviving spouse typically loses a large portion of their retirement income when their partner dies.

## **Raiders Ride Safe Program**

or the fifth consecutive year, Nutley High School's TV III students have taken the challenge to be part of the U Got Brains Champion Schools Program which is presented by The Brain Injury Alliance of New Jersey. This program provides an opportunity for students and staff of New Jersey high schools to produce a campaign emphasizing the safety needed to be taken by teen drivers. In two of the previous five years, the Nutley school district has been

awarded driving simulators which have been infused into the Driver Education curriculum. Last year, students were awarded the grand prize as the top media campaign in the state of New Jersey, being honored at the Champion Schools Program showcase held at Great Adventure.

Each year, students develop a project-based video that outlines the topic at hand. This year our goals were to make a difference utilizing our campaign as a catalyst for town and county officials to address driver and pedestrian

safety. Our production staff hit the streets surveying citizens on Franklin Avenue to assess their knowledge of the speed limit in the school zone territory. Gathering data and soundbites, we realized that we must educate not only our student body, but our community at large.

Meeting with Mayor Scarpelli and Director of Public Safety, Commissioner Petracco, we launched an effort to make physical and cultural changes to our major roadways that lead to our educational community. In our



meetings we discovered that Franklin Avenue comes under the jurisdiction of county government. Our town leaders were motivated by the campaign to approach county officials and identify the lack of an individual's awareness of the school zone.

Student co-producer of the campaign, Elena Navarra, met with the Parent Advisory Committee under the supervision of Principal Denis Williams to inform parents about the trials and tribulations of this campaign. Nicollette Padilla, another co-producer of the campaign, worked with the U Got Brains Champion Program to enforce social media and creative concepts such as pledges and public service announcements to enhance

the campaign's message. Our students used multiple media platforms such as Twitter, Facebook, and NHS TV's YouTube page to create a

common thread in sustaining the message. We also part-

nered with the Public Affairs Department to expand on




their Nutley Pace Car program that raises awareness for pedestrian safety.


## Is Breaking Up with Facebook Hard to Do?

/ith all the negative press about Facebook, people are asking, "What's the alternative?" While some followers will never leave Facebook, others are looking for a place to go. Most ask, "If I leave, where do I go and will my friends come with me?" We all know the stories of networks such as Instagram that became overnight sensations. However, most social networks are built by early adopters who bring their friends along with them, and then grow slowly over time. This creates a personalized vibe and makes the space even more attractive. Take Nextdoor for example, the social network devoted to neighbor-to-neighbor communication in a tight-knit geographical area. Nextdoor is not a Facebook alternative based on its exclusive appeal to neighborhoods, but it serves as a solid metaphor for growth. Nextdoor launched in 2010. By social network standards, Nextdoor grew incredibly slowly. Despite that, Nextdoor became one of the few tech companies to be valued at \$1 billion without earning any revenue because the number of people networking on the platform eventually added up, one neighbor at a time.

Great movements develop over time because a social network's longevity and profitability depend on worthwhile, trusting relationships between its users and the

> network itself. Recently, Myopolis, a very viable alternative to Facebook, subtly and quietly opened their doors offering Citizens (like "friends") the chance to become pioneers of their community and build trust amongst one another. Citizens sound off on topics they care about and are heard by others who care about the same topics. The Leaderboard is a popular component because it



shows the leader in each category at the Local, State and National level. Early adopters will be at the forefront of the latest social movement. The problems Facebook experienced will likely be void because it is centered on the user's ability to filter out what they do and do not want to see and read. A cool bonus is that the original founder of every town in North America will be noted in Myopolis records as the Founder. Now is the time to be a BIG fish in a smaller pond until Myopolis is an ocean. At that point, we will see if Myopolis can stay ahead of the problems Facebook faces today. One can hope.

## **Keith Jaret**

"No man (or woman) is a failure who has friends." –It's A Wonderful Life

eith Jaret had A LOT of friends. And for good reason. Keith was not just Nutley's Cupcake Dude, a title coined because he, along with his wife of 30 years, Maureen, co-owned Jarets Stuffed

Cupcakes on Franklin Avenue, but because he was truly a modern-day Renaissance man with a variety of interests that drew people to him like moths to a lamp.

Keith was called 'the rock-and-roll chef' by many who knew him. When he and Maureen opened their original Nutley restaurant, The Petite Cafe, in 2001, you could find him at the stove every day wearing his trademark hippie bandana, listening to great music, and cooking the unique and delicious food he loved to share with our small, suburban community. He was a huge fan of music and, although not a musician himself, Keith was smart as a whip and so insightful when it came to so many genres. He had an encyclopedic knowledge of his favorites, like The Grateful Dead, Arlo Guthrie, and The Beatles. In the few months before his death, inspired by his friend, Pete Crosta, he began investigating and listening to classical music, as well.

At his celebration of life following his death this past February, many people stood up to tell stories of Keith's passion for music, as well as his generosity towards friends and strangers, his hilarious pranks, his kindness and deep love for his family, children, wife, community, and his faithful companion and beloved dog, Bailey (named for George Bailey from It's a Wonderful Life).

His son, Justin, told a story of Keith's playful nature, a story about a morning when he (Justin), who was notoriously late to school every day, opened his backpack after arriving tardy to his first period class to find his father had removed his notebooks and pencils and filled the space with dog food instead. Keith's brothers and sister reminisced about the pranks he pulled on them growing up together on Long Island and described how he had, even as he was dying, drawn them together one last time - all of the siblings in a room together for the first time in 20 years. His high school friends echoed this, talking about his gift for creating a circle of camaraderie and community where everyone was equal, and everyone was loved.

Long-time customers told tales of his generous spirit, his quirky habit of sitting down at the end of a long shift to tell stories and share poetry late into the night, even knowing he would have to get up before dawn the next morning to cook breakfast for the next wave of customers. Pete reminisces, "he was meticulous in how he delivered what you were about to consume. He put pride and love into everything he touched. There were special nights and occasions that he created when he would pair wines and beers with different types of entrees and desserts. Maureen and Keith would close the cafe to accommodate a 'private audience' in a prix fixe environment. Then Chef Jaret would don his tall, white toque and come out from the kitchen to give a lesson on the wine and/or food



that was being enjoyed that evening. What a treasure chest of knowledge he was!" Perhaps this was Keith's version of a hippie commune, where stories and food, energy and time were shared equally with everyone who came through the door.

Some people know that Keith kept a blog of his personal writing. He started posting in 2012 and wrote until just days before he died. His last post addressed his imminent fate head-on:

"My mind keeps on fighting
But my body betrays my aim
I turned to my center of strength
Found it full of positive energy
From sparks begun at my sacred hunting grounds
Through the ancient gallery of friendship
Up through years of developing love
A wave of love and support
My army of love"

Keith loved lyrics and poetry, and he paid close attention to what was happening in the world outside the cupcake case. When he discovered the social media platform, Facebook, he used it to share openly and honestly how he was feeling. Keith was very progressive and had a quick wit and a well-developed social conscience. He could be counted on to place a well-timed joke or comment or to drop one of his famous puns, and we could all hear him laughing when it landed. His friend, Todd Lacy, read some of his personal favorites with the group gathered to honor Keith's life:

"The first day of my diet I removed all the sweets and bad foods from the house. They were delicious."

"There's a maple tree on my block that's 10 years old, which is not that impressive until you realize that's 70 in Dogwood years."

"On our first date Maureen and I walked down 6th Avenue past the caricaturists. That night we were drawn together."

Keith was a lover, a dreamer, an existential baker. His devotion to Maureen, Justin, Kellie, and his army of love was ribboned throughout his writing. He was a man who cherished the life he had created, and who signed off the same way every time, Laugh, Live and Love in Peace. He meant it then, and now, and forever.



#### **HOW IT ALL BEGAN**

Enter Lawrence O. Vitaletti, a talented amateur baseball player who earned awards for his skills as an infielder. It was his passion for baseball and love for youth activities that spurred him to action upon moving to Nutley in 1951. Vitaletti soon obtained the first Nutley charter that was officially sanctioned by Little League Headquarters in Williamsport, PA.

Play began in 1953 at Glotzbach Field. home of National Little League on Park Avenue. That field would transition to a Farm League field once a new Major League field was built in 1954 on the Grant Avenue side of the complex, off Quarry Street.

has seen Joe volunteer for decades.

Hannon was elected league President in 2011 and enters his eight-season steering the ship, following in the footsteps of Al Alfano, Frank Graziano, Vito Scarpelli, and his grandfather Joseph Mattiello in the early-1970's.

#### A WOMAN'S TOUCH

Debra Gonsalves made history in 1992 when she was elected the first, and only, female President in town at Central League. Gonsalves, a graduate of Nutley High School, joined the league as a volunteer in 1985 when her kids started play. Her husband Tony was a coach while she served as team mom.

"I got involved on the board of directors because to





me, it didn't seem like Little League provided as much fun for the kids anymore," Gonsalves said. "It really needed a different touch - a woman's touch." As President, she sought to change some 'old-school' coaching mentalities.

"There seemed to be too much discipline and not enough teaching," said Gonsalves. "As a registered nurse, I realized that all kids were not psychologically the same. Each child needed to be treated differently on an individual basis. It was wrong to instill punishment at a young age and have kids do laps and make them stay late after practice just because they made a mistake."

"There's more to Little League and youth sports than just winning," stressed Gonsalves. "It's about building a community spirit and a family atmosphere. We even took Nutley kids who had to do community service and put them to work at our field and in our snack stand."

In 2005, after a town-wide decline in participation, National and Central merged to form Nutley East, which plays at Flora Louden Park on Hancox Avenue.

At the original National League site, Glotzbach Field is now home to a new soccer and lacrosse complex. The old clubhouse still stands vacant, while the auxiliary field on Grant Avenue has been transformed to host girl's softball.

More history will undoubtedly be written when Opening Day 2018 for both Nutley American and Nutley East, under the direction of President Chris Lamond, takes place Saturday morning, April 14. Let's play two!

## **Nutley Trolleys** 1892-1937

(PART 2 OF A 3-PART SERIES)

utley trolleys began running in 1896 and the extremely profitable 13 Broad line was sold to Consolidated Traction in 1897. Trolley lines suffered growing pains as towns

and riders demanded more stops, lower rates, noise reduction, and better ride quality. The early cars were open sided with curtains to keep out the elements and dust. They lacked heat or fans, had hard wooden seats, groaning noises from the car's frame, grease and electrical smells, and screeching from the metal wheels. The motormen controlled the stops and starts as set by agreements or shouts from passengers. Passengers were forced to stand during peak ride time and many worked hard jobs in sweat shops and had the odors to prove it.

The fare from Passaic to Belleville was seven cents. From Centre St. to Passaic was five cents. In spite of these low fares, Charles Basch of Passaic was ejected when he refused to pay the extra two cents to pass through Nutley.

His \$5,000 law suit was dismissed on a technicality when he misidentified the company. The fare to Newark was often in dispute and the township charged Consolidated with ordinance violations. Carmen Orechio recalls the trolleys passing his Avondale

home and riding them to North Newark.

Motormen worked nine hour days with one day off in eight at sixty-five cents an hour. They worked in pairs until a strike and improvements made for one-man operation. These men would collect fares, operate manual switches, reconnect trolley poles with a bamboo stick, announce stops and operate the car. At 340 Centre St, a full stop was required to prevent vibrations that collapsed a lady's ceiling. Concrete and cobblestones beneath the rails amplified track noise and made for bone jarring rides on early cars. Straight runs of track were preferred as all turns caused great screeching and extra expense for overhead wires, poles and connections. Overhead wires called catenary lines supplied electricity to a roof-mounted trolley pole connected to the traction motors that propelled the fifty-foot-long trolleys.

The Big Tree car house facility was used for passenger holding, car storage and repairs. Bob DeLitta's grandfather Paul Fusco's first job after immigrating from Italy was at Big Tree where he was nearly electrocuted doing repairs atop a car. This facility was updated after a fire in 1989 and is still used by NJ Transit. Historical maps show the landmark big tree. Further south was Hillside Pleasure Park, a picnic grove converted to amusement park, operating from 1905-1927.

1903 marked the powerful and monopolistic Public Service Corporation takeover of operations. Car designs became more civilized as windows and doors were added, seats got rattan cushions, various roof designs provided ventilation and ride quality improved. Courts said all lines must operate regardless of profit or loss. This ruling became important as the build up to World War I created a need to transport vast armies of workers to factories and shipyards. Automobiles were starting to appear and having an adverse impact on ridership. Trolleys were being decommissioned and scrapped, putting the U.S. at risk of an infrastructure shortage, just when they were needed. One car is rumored to have been put into the Avondale guarry. Nutley's roadway was double tracked in 1915, enabling greater capacity.

In 1923, Public Service Coordinated Transport had over two thousand trolleys in service and remained a division of Public Service Gas & Electric until 1982 when NJ Transit was formed.
