Driving By the Pucci Home

o you remember the birthday drive-by parades during lockdown? Wasn't that a creative way to celebrate while still staying safe?

Our cover story family–Christine, Dan, and Ella Pucci– not only remembers the lines of cars driving through town but were the very first people that had a parade pass by their house!

It happened on March 21, 2020, to celebrate Ella Pucci's fourth birthday. More than 40 cars drove past her house, sporting banners, streamers, and balloons, beeping their horns as people waved out their windows.

"We had to cancel two birthday parties for Ella," Christine said. "She was going to have a bowling party with her friends and then a family



party that Sunday. But when her aunt read a story about a boy in California who celebrated his birthday with a car parade, she made some phone calls and set one up for Ella. Seeing how happy she was made everyone's day and week so much better."

This first-ever Nutley parade became the inspiration for many other residents to have their own version as they celebrated special days with loved ones.

Coincidentally, the Pucci family motto is "Roll with the punches." Making the most of life's changes and chances is at the heart of this family who has one unfailing constant in their lives.

"We love Nutley," Christine said. "Dan and I both grew up here and met when we were five since we

both attended Spring Garden School. We then went to the middle school and then graduated Nutley High School in 2004. But we weren't even friends; we hung around in different social groups!"

But as their lives changed, a chance opportunity came along that brought their lives together again.

"After high school we went to college, and it wasn't until 2011 that we saw each other again," Christine said. "Dan was having a volleyball tournament in his backyard and he was looking for some more women players. I joined them and the weekend was like a high school reunion. After the tourna-

ment, he asked me out on a date, and we saw the newest Harry Potter movie. It's really funny that we knew each other since we were five but started dating when we were 25!"

After a few years and many other dates, the couple got married on March 13, 2015. Today, they are active Nutley *Neighbors,* busy with their respective careers, community involvement, and their 5-year-old daughter, Ella.

"Dan has a mechanical engineering degree from Lafayette College and is Assistant Project Manager at Torcon in Red Bank," Christine said. "I have a bachelor's degree in English and went on to get my teaching



certification. I have been teaching for 8 years; this is my fourth year at Bloomfield High School and previously, I was at a private school for 4 years."

This past summer, Christine also taught at Nutley's Let's Learn Summer Program which gives students the opportunity to spend the early weeks of their summer vacation engaged in STEAM courses (science, technology, engineering, art, and math) theater, cooking, and yoga activities.

"I taught engineering to small children," she said. "There are many fun and educationally challenging topics for students in grades kindergarten through sixth."

And speaking of school, Ella started Spring Garden School, the same school her parents attended, in September.

"She is the fourth generation growing up here in town," Christine said. "Both of her Nutley great-grandparents are 99 years old."

The specific neighborhood they live in is not only close to family but holds a lot of special memories.

"The main reasons we chose to live in this section of town were to be closer to school and our families," Christine said. "We bought the house next door to where I grew up. We are also two houses away from my grandma

and a few houses from my brother. This is a wonderful neighborhood with a mix of older families and a lot of new couples with children moving in."

The canine members of their household enjoy their forever home here as well.

"Both of our dogs are rescues," Christine said. "Kobe is a mix of Labrador and Dalmatian and is eight, and Maggie May is a one-year-old Labrador and shepherd mix."

Dan, Christine, and Ella are also active throughout Nutley as they interact with businesses, volunteer, or take part in town sports.

"We are very big on supporting small businesses, especially the food places," Christine said. "One of our



favorites is Cucina 355, and we are at Jim Dandy's just about every Friday. We like to volunteer at the Kingsland Manor to help set up the Christmas decorations and to do some gardening. And we are so happy that Ella started playing recreation soccer and lacrosse. We're hoping that eventually they will have a female lacrosse team when she gets older."

Trusting the future is part of how they Pucci family 'rolls with the

punches.' Christine and Dan know that life can be surprising in some very good ways. Who would have thought that those five-year-olds in Spring Garden School, who graduated high school together without ever being in the same social circle, would eventually get married and have a daughter who is now a five-year-old in the same school?

Although Ella Pucci had to have her birthday party canceled in 2020, this family showed a resilience that

GRATITUDE IS CRITICAL: Wrestling Clinic Returns

Over 50 wrestlers and coaches joined Joe Dubque and Pat Glory on July 15th for a memorable Princeton night of wrestling at Nutley Parks and Recreation.

t's been a long year and a half. There have been many inconsistencies in how to handle COVID-19 and some of the best-laid plans have been thrown out the window several times. No one knows this more than Coach Michael Blanchard. Two weeks before the wrestling season was supposed to start, everything changed. Suddenly, he found himself leading a group of over 90 wrestlers and their families into a non-season.

"I had a choice to make. I decided to go with hope and positivity. I decided to focus on being grateful for what we had and concentrated our efforts into two town-wide food drives," stated Blanchard. "Our wrestling group needed something to direct our collective energy on that was productive."

It was many months later when the non-season was behind them, and baseball, track, spring soccer, and lacrosse were in full swing. Coach Blanchard reached out to his good friends, Frank DeMaio and Michael DiPiano, to float the idea of launching wrestling again with what used to be an annual wrestling clinic. Parks and Recreation was completely supportive. Mayor Mauro Tucci's grandsons even signed up.

"Our goal has been to use the clinic as a springboard into the regular season. It helps bring new kids into the fold, and it also gives us a chance to showcase talent from our local colleges and universities," Blanchard explained. "The clinic started four or five years ago, and then I got the idea to bring in Joey McKenna (Ohio State alum and NCAA national runner up). Joey is from New Jersey, and once we got him, I thought the sky's the limit."

Blanchard is a wrestling guy. He wrestled four years at The College of New Jersey, where he and DiPiano became teammates and friends. He captained the team his senior year and never looked back. He went on to coach at Rutherford High School, where he promoted the sport endlessly for over a decade. Wrestling is in his blood, but

more importantly, he sees wrestling as a means to an end.

"It helps prepare young people for life. Things like developing work ethic, dealing with adversity, and perseverance are all intangibles that a young person gains by participating," Blanchard explained. "I'm lucky I had good coaches and good influences. I still look to those people today in my adult life. They helped make me a better human being."

This summer, Blanchard enlisted the help of his 18 recreation coaches and set the clinic in motion with four nights of wrestling. Rutgers Head Wrestling Coach, Scott Goodale, and his freshman All-American wrestler,

John Poznanski, were featured on Tuesday, July 13th. On Thursday, July 15th, Princeton's Associate Head Wrestling Coach, Joe Dubuque (a Bloomfield/Glen Ridge native), and his U23 National Champion and All-American, Patrick Glory, closed out the clinic. Dubuque and Glory were supposed to come the year before, but COVID-19 had other plans. Blanchard was overflowing with gratitude for all four New Jersey legends being present.

Both college programs taught moves and spoke to the kids about being good students as well as being good wrestlers.

> "We focused our four nights towards the idea of gratitude," Blanchard said. "Being thankful and showing thanks has always been a staple of my life. After a year away from the sport I love and the thing I am most passionate about, it was terrific to be able to remember the hardships of the previous year while holding supreme

gratitude for the time ahead of us. I hope our young people will not forget those lessons most of all. Anyone can teach you wrestling moves, but having a grateful nature is something that will last longer in their lives."

Blanchard's mantra is sure to be present again as the team looks to start up in November.

"We will have gratitude for the good moments and even the bad ones. Good or bad, these things shape us and matter. People matter. Young people matter most of all." ■

or many of us, Social Security benefits are an important part of our retirement income, along with retirement plans and personal savings. But not all of us will get the same amount from Social Security. In fact, if you paid into Social Security and are eligible for benefits, your personal Social Security benefits will vary depending on your age at retirement, marital status, lifetime earnings history, and the year you were born.

What is your "full retirement age"?

While we often think of retirement age as 65, according to the Social Security Administration, you are entitled to full Social Security retirement benefits only when you reach somewhere between 66 and 67, depending on the year you were born:

When you reach full retirement age, you are entitled to: Your full core Social Security benefit

Keep working without having your Social Security benefits reduced, regardless of how much you earn

What if you want to retire sooner?

A smaller monthly check than you'd see if you'd waited until full retirement age.

Benefit checks that remain that smaller amount for the rest of your life, except for cost-of-living adjustments.
 Reduced benefits, if you work even part-time.

Maximize your benefit by waiting longer.

You can start taking Social Security benefits as late as age 70. If you decide to wait past your full retirement age, you could see a real boost in the payments you receive. In fact:

Social Security will add a little bit to your benefit for every month you wait past your full retirement age, up to age 70.

■ If you continue working past your full retirement age and have a relatively high-income year or two, you could substantially increase your benefit.

When to take benefits - it's up to you!

Nutley History

Harry W. Chenoweth, Longest-Serving Nutley Mayor

Il Nutleyites have occasion to visit our beautiful Town Hall, often to pay property taxes or transact other business. If you have paused to read the building's name, posted over its front doors, you have noticed that officially it's the Harry W. Chenoweth Building. The building was named for that important Nutleyite back in 1994, and it has remained so ever since.

But do you know who Harry W. Chenoweth was? In brief, he was the longest-serving Mayor in the history of our town. In fact, he is our all-time champion Mayor, because he held that office in all the following years:

 1976 - 1980
 1964 - 1968
 1956 - 1960

 1968 - 1972
 1960 - 1964
 1952 - 1956

That's a pretty astonishing record of service to our town. So, who was Mayor Chenoweth? Let's find out.

About Our Esteemed Former Mayor Harry Chenoweth (1910-1997)

We are pleased to share the following biography from *Nutley Notables, Volume 1* by Anthony Buccino. (Used with permission.)

Harry Chenoweth's love and concern for his community is a story of deep and active involvement. He identified problems and acted to solve them, both as initiator and participant. His dedication to community activities has been recognized as evidenced by his election to the office of mayor for 20 consecutive years.

During World War II, he was a Reconnaissance Sergeant in the 8th Cavalry Division, U.S. Army. He participated in



the Battle of the Bulge. Chenoweth was wounded by shrapnel in the head and shoulders.

His many activities in veteran's organizations are the result of his service experiences. He was a member of the Nutley Chapter of AMVETS, the American Legion, Catholic War Veterans and

Veterans of Foreign Wars.

When Chenoweth returned home from his war experiences, he turned to community service. Health causes were a special interest. Some of the most significant health projects with which he was involved include: Nutley Volunteer and Rescue Squads and Free Adult Health Clinic.

Mayor Chenoweth knew only one community during his lifetime - the community of Nutley. He lived in the house at 200 Hillside Avenue. He graduated from Nutley High School, attended Rutgers University, and then the New Jersey Law School.

So, the next time you drop by the Harry W. Chenoweth Building, please pause a moment to remember this great man and his long record of service to our town. Like all the mayors in our history, we owe him an immense debt of gratitude. ■


